The module also equips students to reflect theologically on complex issues within their missional context, exploring appropriate methodologies to help them integrate theory and practice and adopt a critical interdisciplinary approach to theological reflection, for instance engaging with social sciences.

Indicative syllabus	 Models and methodologies that can facilitate a critical interdisciplinary approach to theological reflection (such as the Theological Imperative model and tools such as the four voices of theology), including the integration of theory and practice in assessing ministry context and practice; Deepening students' understanding and analysis of ecclesiology, including consideration of the global church and issues such as church and state and the interplay between Christianity and Western cultural values; Assessing complex and contentious missional concepts and strategies, such as the role of the Spirit in mission, the Homogenous Unit Principle and incarnational ministry; Utilising and evaluating anthropological models (such as Hofstede's) and tools for understanding cultural contexts, exploring issues such as leadership and power, shame and honour, and individual and community; Reflecting theologically on key features of contemporary UK contexts, such as critical race theory, gender fluidity, and new technologies.
