<b>Brief description</b>	This module provides an opportunity for students to undertake a significant piece of research or scholarship on a topic of their choice, appropriate and related to the programme award title, and incorporating research involving human participants. It supports the application and development of research skills and enables students to become increasingly independent learners, capable of managing and planning their own work. Through a systematic and extended process of inquiry, this module enables students to demonstrate high levels of critical engagement with their chosen subject matter alongside an appreciation of the uncertainty, ambiguity and limits of knowledge.
